

### Drug Testing

#### Considerations

- ✓ Degree of exposure risk
- Minimum testing necessary to maintain efficacy
- Response to missed appointments due to illness, quarantine, shelterin-place, or fear

#### Examples

- √ Temporarily halt all testing
- ✓ Halt testing that could expose staff to respiratory or other bodily fluids (e.g., oral fluid, breathalyzer testing)
- ✓ Encourage self-disclosure
- ✓ Use technology where appropriate and available (e.g., continuous alcohol monitoring, smartphone monitoring, transdermal patches)

### Case Management/Supervision

#### Consideratio

- ✓ Degree of exposure risk
- Ability to enforce social distancing in your building/lobby
- ✓ Alternatives to in-person contact
- ✓ Response to missed appointments due to illness, quarantine, or shelter-in-place

#### Examples

- ✓ Halt all community, home, and reduce in-person office contacts
- Meet in areas that allow you to have appropriate distance and preferably a barrier
- ✓ Institute alternatives to in-person contact (e.g. Zoom, phone, email, Skype)
- ✓ May need to increase virtual contact

### Incentives and Sanctions

### Considerations

- ✓ Degree of exposure risk
- Response to missed appointments due to illness, quarantine, or shelter-in-place
- ✓ Community service may not be an option

#### Examples

- ✓ Provide incentives to increase participants' willingness to communicate openly, frequently, and honestly
- ✓ Only utilize sanctions that can be enforces
- ✓ Utilize therapeutic responses to behavior as much as possible

## Examples of Creative Incentives, Sanctions, and Community Service

#### Incentives

- ✓ Send a note/card from the Judge/Team
- ✓ Send gift cards, chips, certificates through the mail
- ✓ Keep track of call-ins or other targeted behavior and offer large incentive
- ✓ List specific behaviors with specific incentives
- ✓ Incentive bingo/scavenger hunt
- ✓ Early graduation/completion
- Sanctions

#### ✓Zoom Team meetings

- ✓ Send notes of encouragement to EMT's, nursing homes, etc.
- ✓ Attend virtual classes (yoga, boot camp, art, support groups)
- ✓ Watch a TED talk on a specific topic and write a report
- ✓ Lengthen time in program

#### Community Service

- ✓ Send notes of encouragement to EMT's, nursing homes, etc.
- ✓ Donate to a food pantry, library ✓Visit Milwaukee County's website for
